From the Vicarage

Dear Friends

Call it nostalgia if you like, but there was something appealingly simple about the Harvest Thanksgiving of my childhood. We were not farmers, and even then, we were well aware that the food we ate came from far and wide across the world, but we were giving thanks for that provision. What I remember most are the smells, of home-grown fruit, a freshly baked harvest loaf and the bale of hay from a local farm. We had much to be thankful for, and Harvest was the time to remember that.

Today that simple truth is tied in with a plethora of other themes. Through my lifetime, we have become increasingly aware of the ways we are destroying this planet and abusing the resources entrusted to us. Harvest is now part of the Creation Season when we are encouraged to reflect on our stewardship of this planet. Harvest as a focus for helping others has also moved on. I recall as a schoolboy delivering mushroom baskets filled with a couple of carrots, a few potatoes, an apple and an orange to the over 60's. Come to think of it I would have been due one myself for a few years now! Even then we realized that these gifts were tokens, but they did show that people were being thought of and remembered. These days the Harvest collection of dried and tinned goods, from schools and churches, has become an essential source not just for homeless charities but for foodbanks, supporting those who in 2024 still struggle to feed themselves and their families. Supporting those in poverty around the world has also become a harvest theme. To some the Bishop's Appeal "Harvesting a Love of Learning" might seem to stretch the notion, but it reflects the fact that education and literacy are a prime way to improve people's prospects and allow them to help themselves.

All these themes are important, and I hope Harvest 2024 will see an outpouring of generosity to both the Bishop's Appeal and the foodbank and homeless charities we support but I hope that generosity will begin from a simple and profound sense of gratitude and thanksgiving. In gratitude for the beauty and wonder of creation we commit ourselves afresh to protect it for future generations.

Thankful for the good things we enjoy, we want others to have them too, and so we seek to share and to remember the less fortunate. We recently began our new monthly informal service for children and families, St Chad's @5 with a focus on giving thanks. Christians always begin in thanksgiving. We share in The Eucharist, the Greek word for thanksgiving, as we remember all that Jesus has done for us and from that should flow a life of grateful service. To the surprise of some, one of the appointed Harvest readings is the healing of the Ten Lepers. All ten are cleansed, but only one takes the trouble to return and give thanks to Jesus - and he is a Samaritan. I sometimes wonder what became of them. Did the one who came back, and indeed the other nine, live thankful lives? Did they make the most of being set free from a debilitating disease and from the social isolation that went with it? We will never know, but it serves to remind me that gratitude involves so much more than words. A timely "Thank you" will never go amiss and should not be despised, but Harvest Thanksgiving is a call to a way of living flowing in response to the gracious generosity of our God, whose love knows no bounds. As St Paul reminds us in Colossians 3 v 14-15, a passage often read at weddings but also a powerful summary of the Christian life.

"Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in the one body. And be thankful."

Harvest Thanksgiving 2024

We will keep Harvest at St Chad's on October 6th, and on Monday 7th October at 9.30am Poulton CE School will hold their Harvest Service in St Chad's.

On October 13th we will keep Harvest at St Anne's Singleton and at St Hilda's. As in previous years we will be collecting dried and tinned goods to help homeless projects and the local Foodbank. Many of you will know that we have a basket for the Foodbank at St Chad's, throughout the year and we are blessed with regular and generous supporters. I know our gifts are much appreciated and help to make a difference.

There is also the opportunity to support the Bishop of Blackburn's Harvest Appeal, entitled "Harvesting a Love of Learning". This is going to support the Diocese of Multan in Pakistan, in its education work, improving literacy among women and children. The Bishop of Multan, Bishop Leo, recently visited the diocese and spoke of how the church is growing, in spite of poverty and discrimination, in a country where Islam is the dominant religion, and Christians are less than 1% of the population.

Care for Creation

António Guterres (United Nations Secretary-General) has said that we're at 'Code red for humanity: the alarm bells are deafening, and the evidence is irrefutable: greenhouse gas emissions from fossil fuel burning and deforestation are choking our planet and putting billions of people at immediate risk.'

At this time of **Creationtide**, how are we to respond to these climate concerns?

The world belongs to God:

'The earth is the Lord's and everything in it' (Psalm 24:1). The world is not ours, but God's!

We are called to share in care for God's world: 'Be fruitful and increase in number; fill the earth and subdue it. Rule over the fish in the sea and the birds in the sky and over every living creature that moves on the ground.' (Genesis 1:28).

We represent God by governing with the same self-giving generosity that we see in His creation of the earth. This challenges our consumer mindset, that sees the earth's resources as both limitless and existing simply for our needs. For example, the fashion industry uses as much carbon per minute, as a car emits going six times round the world! How can we make a difference in our world?

We belong to Christ:

We also belong to the one whose plan is: 'to be put into effect when the times reach their fulfilment – to bring unity to all things in heaven and on earth under Christ.' (Ephesians 1:10). We can look forward to the time when God will create a new heaven and a new earth and make everything new. Meanwhile, we are called

to serve as He serves, caring for the earth and our fellow humans, by living simply, recycling, conserving energy and choosing reusable options.

In terms of our world, there is no plan B! God gave us only one planet!

Reflecting Faith: Window Glass

Recently I wrote about the Arts and Crafts Movement's influence in the decoration of churches in Britain. This is often evidenced in the designs of windows – but why do we have so much coloured glass of all shapes and sizes in church buildings?

Stained glass in churches is similar to wall paintings in that it adds colour as well as traditionally serving the purpose of teaching non-literate people the great events and characters of their religion.

But glass is so much more than that.

The techniques used to create these windows have been refined over the centuries, and their intricate beauty has inspired countless artists and designers.

The way the light shines through the glass creates a unique atmosphere that is often described as ethereal or heavenly. In this way, the use of stained-glass windows helps to create a sacred space that is set apart from the secular world.

The light shining through the glass is shown onto the brickwork or stonework surrounding the glass and depending on the original colours, the intensity of the light, the angle of the sun's rays as well as the height and angle away from the watcher: these can range from vibrantly strong to softly muted.



Hundreds of years ago people saw the changes in light in this way as being very significant. It was thought that the light passing through was transformed or transmuted and because of this it had a healing and revivifying effect on people who placed themselves within its light.

This month - Visit a church on a sunny day and just enjoy the play of light being put on for you. What does it say about God's love for you?

Christians Against Poverty "deeply concerned" at Ofgem energy price cap increase

Following Ofgem's recent announcement that average energy bills are set to rise by 10% from this month (October), Christians Against Poverty's Chief Executive Officer, Stewart McCulloch has voiced the charity's concerns.

Stewart McCulloch said: "Almost half our clients already face the devastating reality of not having enough to pay for their basic needs, including energy costs.

"With the average household's energy bill set to rise by £149 to over £1,700 per year from October this has the potential to push even more to breaking point. Daily, we see families forced to live in cold, unlit homes, unable to cook a warm meal because they can't afford the cost of gas or electricity.

"But we don't have to accept this. With energy prices set to remain high, CAP is keen to work with the new Government to put in place long term and targeted support so that everyone can afford to keep warm and safe.

"A key element of this would be the creation of a dedicated 'Help to Repay' scheme to support people struggling to repay energy arrears.

"The brutal consequences for people's health and wellbeing of being unable to afford to pay for energy have now become too serious to ignore."
